

Read around set for members' poetry works: Using early language development study from last month's meeting

Using the training program from last month involving "Early Language Development Using Poetry," WCCW members will present their creative concepts as taught by Donna Nelson: Poetry's role in the development of language skills, both spoken and written, in school age children."

Poetic devices add to the color of creative writing as well as setting the pace in a rhythmical fashion. All of that helps the reader sail along and capture the scenery. These devices are many and often use alliteration, consonance, metaphors and other speech patterns to define characters and create easy to read material, especially for children's books.

A particularly compelling device is the onomatopoeia, difficult for some writers, but once mastered can weave a thrilling experience to the art of the wordmith. Take, for example, this phrase from the poem, Jabberwacky, by Lewis Carroll:

'Twas brillig, and the slithy toves did gyre and gimble in the wabe All mimsy were the borogoves, and the mome raths outgrabe.
